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Introduction

Being able to read is an essential skill in today's society. The future classroom success of the students we serve may directly be related to how well they read and comprehend the reading material. When teaching reading, we want our students to be able to read, comprehend what they read, and enjoy being able to read. Often times it is difficult to motivate students to read, especially if they have had difficulty in the past. *DOT Reading Comprehension* was written to assist students who are "at risk" in improving their reading comprehension skills by providing an innovative motivation component—ink daubers! After reading a high interest passage the students have the opportunity to mark up their game sheets using ink daubers as they answer comprehension questions.

DOT Reading Comprehension includes interesting reading passages to be read by the students and motivating game sheets to monitor comprehension. When applicable, each passage is marked with the reading level at the bottom of the page and may be used as a reference or for tracking purposes. Each high-interest reading passage in Levels 2 and 3 is written at a controlled reading level of 5.0 or below, based on the *Flesch-Kincaid Reading Scale*.

This book is arranged into five theme based sections: *insects & pets, people & activities, ocean & water, fantasy, and zoo life*. Each theme-based section is arranged into three levels, each level being more difficult than the previous.

Level 1 contains a simple sentence or set of sentences that the students match to a picture.

Level 2 contains a simple paragraph and corresponding picture. The students answer three factual based questions based upon the information within the text.

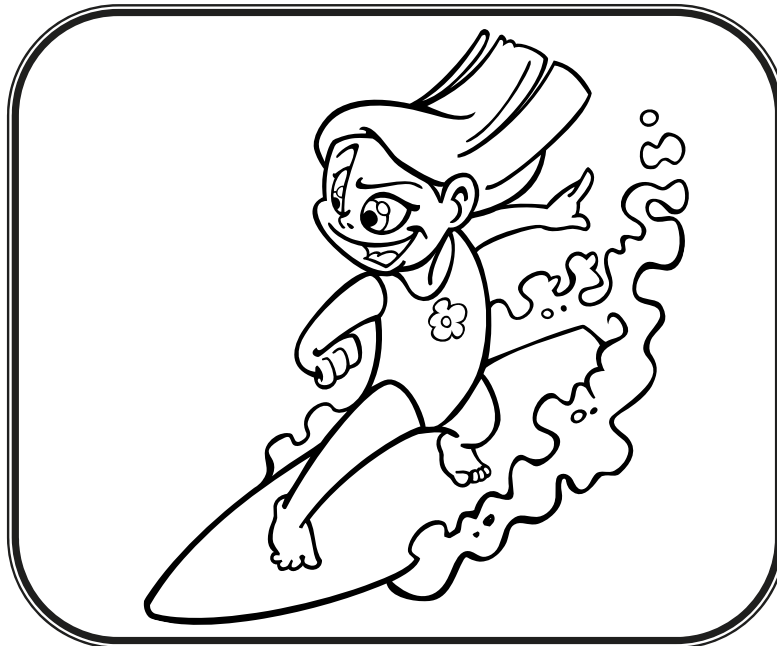
Level 3 contains paragraphs and short stories. The questions in Level 3 should be presented orally to the students so that they can mark their game sheets as they answer the questions appropriately. The questions are arranged into three sets. *Set #1 Questions* require students to answer factual questions based upon the passage. *Set #2 Questions* require students to retell, give the main idea, paraphrase, define a word, give an antonym/synonym, give rhyming words, describe something from the passage, or categorize information in the passage. *Set #3 Questions* ask the students to make predictions or inferences about something in the passage, evaluate the information in the passage, or give opinions/self experiences in relation to the passage.

It is important to model comprehension strategies and provide guided assistance for your students. This will assist them in becoming fluent and reflective readers. Add to what is presented in this resource book by encouraging your students to discuss what they know about the information presented in each passage. Extend what is presented by having the students add alternate endings. Don't be afraid to add a pencil and paper component after the games sheets have been filled. Use your own reading expertise to enhance what is offered in *DOT Reading Comprehension*!

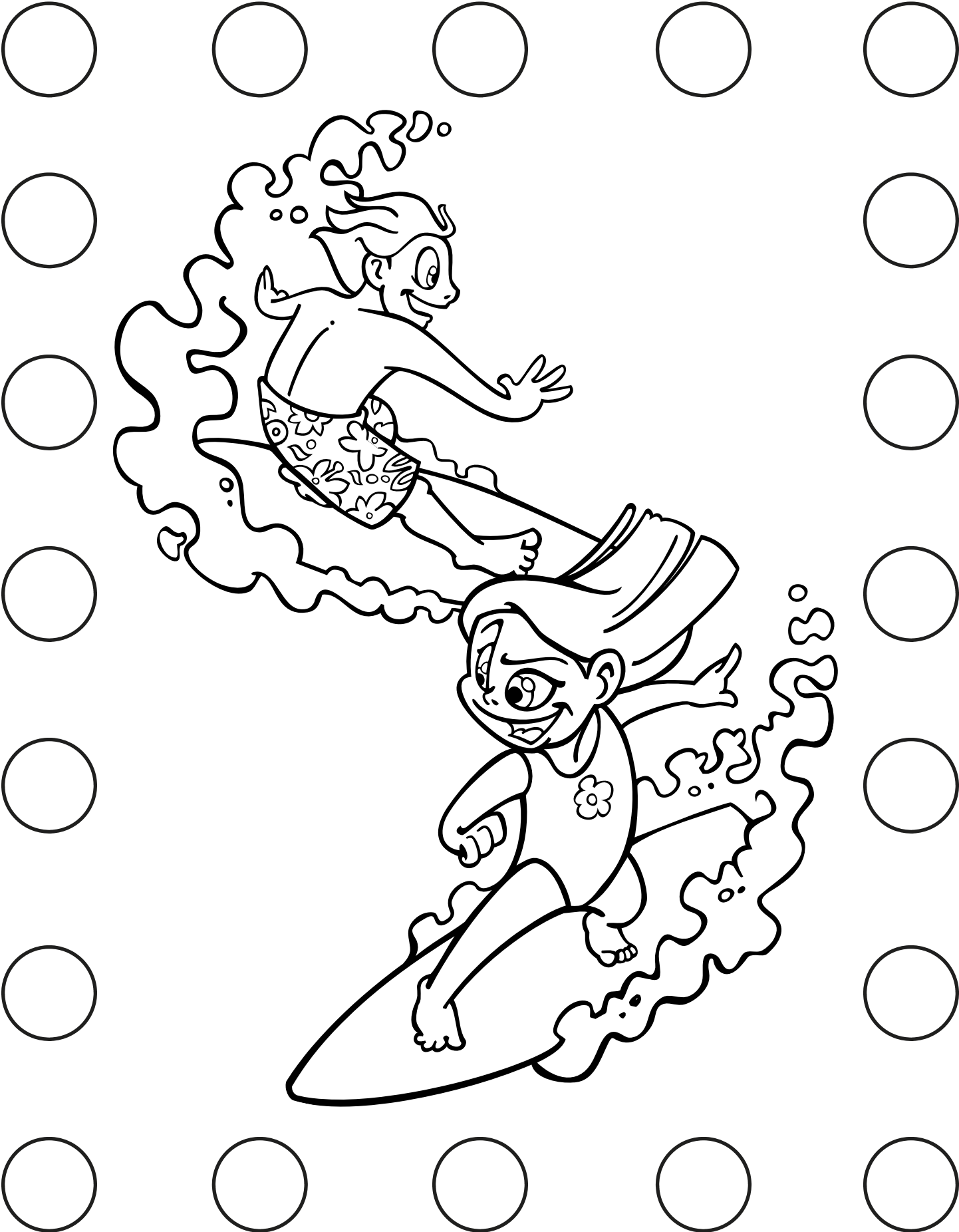
